#### Alexis Milligan | Director

Alexis Milligan is the founding director of Transitus Creative, an interdisciplinary arts organization specializing in Art Communication and public engagement through the arts transitus.ca. She has been a project partner in knowledge translation and exchange with The Dalhousie University School of Nursing (Palliative Education through Art Communication and Engagement), the Association of Nova Scotia Museums (Touchstones), and with gender consultant Michelle Raine (It's A Girl!).

Alexis is also an acclaimed actor, movement specialist and director with a number of awards and nominations to her name. She is currently in her fourth season as Movement Director at The Shaw Festival in Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ontario. As a noted artistic collaborator she has created choreography and movement for many theatre companies across Canada including Two Planks and a Passion Theatre, Eastern Front Theatre, Mermaid Theatre, Off The Leash Ltd., OneLight Theatre and Theatre Gargantua. Other credits include movement and puppetry director for the sold out run of The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe at The Stratford Festival, as well as En Jülefortelling (A Christmas Carol) with the National Theatre of Norway in Bergen.

### Steve Lucas | Set Designer

Since 1987 Steve has designed award winning sets and lighting for more than 500 productions of theatre, dance and performance art.

His work has run the gamut, Starting with his design debut at the Poor Alex with See Bob Run [also Daniel Macivor's Toronto Debut] he has done everything from family Christmas pantos to radical eastern European avant garde. Working in Large venues to Storefronts, from Off Broadway to The woman's washroom at Buddies in Bad times. From Tokyo to St Petersburg to Port Dover.

His work has toured extensively and has been seen all across Canada, the United States, the UK, Europe, Scandinavia, Russia, Australia, and Asia. 25 countries so far!

Steve's work in theatre has mainly been focused on new and original plays; he has designed the world premieres of literally hundreds of shows, many of which have gone on to further acclaim. ### Sherry Kinnear | Costume Designer

Sherry is the costume designer for the TNB Young Company and TNB Theatre School as well as the Head of Wardrobe for all branches of the company. Sherry most recently designed costumes for The Boat, The Snow Queen, A Sunday Affair, Marion Bridge, Vigil, The Drowsy Chaperone, The Eighth Fire, and The Net, as well as Guys & Dolls, West Side Story, The Wizard of Oz, Les Miserables and has created costumes for A Christmas Carol, Frankenstein, Miracle on 34th Street, It's a Wonderful Life, Little Shop of Horrors, Gifts of the Magi, The Dollar Woman, Treasure Island, and many other TNB productions over the past ten years.



### Ian Sherwood | Composer and Sound Designer

Armed with a saxophone, guitar, looping pedal and a voice that won him a Canadian Folk Music Award for contemporary singer of the year, Sherwood has charmed his way across the country and UK with his unique brand of genre-shifting music and stage show. A natural storyteller with a timeless sound, his influences are some of the best folk/pop/country singer-songwriters; from Bruce Springsteen to Tom Waits and Blue Rodeo.

He recently debuted his first original work Fruit Machine as the main stage production at the Notable Acts Theatre Festival. #### Sharisse LeBrun | Assistant Director

Sharisse LeBrun is an educator, director, performer and director of the TNB Theatre School. She has long been involved with the local theatre community with companies including Theatre St. Thomas, Theatre UNB, Bard in the Barracks, TNB Next Stage, Notable Acts, Hot Garbage Players and Solo Chicken. After years of attending the theatre school as a student she developed a passion for theatre education and began teaching for many of the junior programs as well as the summer theatre school. Having completed her MA in drama, theatre, and performance studies, she is thrilled to find herself back home teaching and creating with Theatre New Brunswick.

### Pre-Performance Activities: BOYS LIKE, GIRLS LIKE, KIDS LIKE

Curriculum Connections: Physical Education and Language Arts

**Purpose:** Gender and identity are important topics in the play. This activity encourages students to explore and discuss gender roles in a critical way. It identifies and aims to distinguish the many gender biases and stereotypes that occur in our society.

Materials: large chart paper, markers, sticky notes, scissors, glue/tape.

**Preparation:** On one piece of large chart paper, create a two-circle Venn diagram labeled "Boys Like" on one side and "Girls Like" on the other side. Make sure that the two circles are significantly overlapped. On another piece of chart paper, simply write "Kids Like" at the top. For younger students, prepare multiple sticky notes with one activity or object on each (examples: dolls, cars, dresses, climbing trees, skateboarding, movies, etc.). Ensure that the number of sticky notes you prepare is the same as (or a multiple of) the number of students.

- Hand out 1-3 sticky notes to each student. Tell students to write down an object or an activity that boys or girls like. In the case of younger students, these activities will already be written on the sticky notes.
- With the Venn diagram posted at the front of the classroom, have students come to the board and put their sticky notes in the section of the Venn diagram where they believe it should go (example: a student who wrote "dolls" would likely place that under "Girls Like"). Be sure to inform students that the middle of the diagram is for things that both boys and girls like.
- After all sticky notes have been put on the board, facilitate a discussion on each of the sticky notes. For each sticky note on either side of the Venn diagram, ask students if it is possible for the other gender to like that as well ("Can a boy like dolls too?"). Give students examples of how each is possible, pulling examples from the media if possible. The goal at this point is to move all the sticky notes into the middle of the diagram.
- Once all sticky notes are in the center of the diagram, cut out the center of the diagram and glue/tape it to another chart paper that says "Kids Like" at the top. Alternative: simply cross out "Boys Like" and "Girls Like" and write "Kids Like" at the top of the Venn diagram.

### Pre-Performance Activities: "I AM" POEM

Curriculum Connections: Language Arts and Visual Arts

**Purpose:** In the play, the main character Simon is tasked with finding his "true self". He does this by acting as various mythical creatures until he finds out who he really is. The purpose of this activity is for students to think about who they are and what makes them unique.

Materials: Worksheet, writing tools.

- Introduce the activity by telling the students that each of them is unique and that we all are special in our own way, just like the characters in "Boys, Girls, and Other Mythological Creatures".
- Give students the handout and ask them to fill in the blanks to the writing prompts.
- After, ask the students to draw a picture of themselves in the space provided and to decorate the page.
- Ask the students if anyone would like to share their "I Am" poem.
- Display their work in the room as a reminder for students that they are unique.


### Post-Performance Activities: MY SAFE PLACE

Curriculum Connections: Visual Arts, Language Arts and Math

**Purpose:** Everyone should have a place where they feel completely safe. This is a place that should be overflowing with care and acceptance, while being free of judgement and other negative feelings. Simon's safe space is in his basement. This activity helps students think of places where they feel safe, as well as encourage them to think about people with whom they feel safe.

**Materials:** square pieces of paper (see diagram printout), scissors, writing/drawing utensils (pencil crayons, markers, crayons, etc.) Preparation: Print out one diagram for each student. For younger students, cut and fold each diagram but do not glue together.

- Students should brainstorm places where they feel safe (examples: home, bedroom, basement, etc.) and people with whom they feel safe (examples: mom, dad, grandma, best friend). After some time to brainstorm, students should choose three of them to use for the activity.
- Each student should receive a diagram. Each of the three triangles will represent one of their choices in step 1. Students should fill in each triangle with writing and/or drawings that represent that triangle's safe space or person. Make sure students rotate their diagram as they fill out each triangle so that the bottom of their drawing is on the outer edge of the square (this is for the next step).
- After students are finished, glue together as indicated. This will make a triangle-based pyramid that the student can stand up, displaying their safe spaces/people on each side of the 3-dimensional figure. Tell students that the triangle is the strongest geometric 2-D shape, and that their creation should remind them of some of the places and people that make them feel safe and strong.



### Post-Performance Activities: MY TRUE SELF COLLAGE

Curriculum Connections: Visual Arts and Media Arts

**Purpose:** In the play, Simon discovers his true self. This activity is for students to express their true self in the form of a collage. This activity is designed in a way so that only the individual who makes the collage can truly understand who their true self is. This is so students can feel comfortable with what they put on their collage even if their ideas are private.

Materials: computers, printer, Bristol board, glue, scissors, markers, construction paper.

**Preparation:** A computer lab containing a printer should be booked during class time.

- Write the following questions on the board (or display on projector): o "What/Who do I love absolutely?"
  - "What do I consider my greatest accomplishments?"
  - "What would be my purpose if I knew no one would judge me?"
  - "If there were no limits to what I could have or could want in my life, what would that be?"
  - "If I had all the money in the world, what would I do?"
- Give students a moment to think about some of the answers to the above questions. If they would like, students can write down some of their answers.
- Explain to the students that they will be making a collage for their true self that will be based on of some of their answers to the above questions. In order for some mystery, tell students that they are only allowed to use pictures on their collage. The only words on their collage should be "My True Self". This allows students to be open and comfortable putting whatever they desire on their collage.
- Using computers or iPads, give students plenty of time to search and choose pictures to use for their collage. Students should choose 15-20 pictures. Assist students in printing their pictures.
- Once students have all their pictures printed, they can start making their collage. Provide each student with a Bristol board for their collage. Students can make their collage using any of the provided materials.
- Display your students' collages in your classroom to remind them to be and to love their true selves.




## From the Stars in the Sky to the Fish in the Sea


