Each year, the Company travels from one end of the province to the other, from Grand Manan to Campbellton, performing in public schools for students grades 1-12.

For most students, TNB Young Company is their first introduction to live, professionally produced theatre. In many of the smaller communities in which TNB Young Company performs, it is also students' only access to theatre.

All shows are carefully selected for their relevancy, high educational content and themes. They also serve to showcase a host of talented actors, designers and production staff, many of whom are from New Brunswick.

After more than 40 years' experience touring and performing, it is estimated that TNB Young Company have shared the theatre experience with more than 500,000 New Brunswick students.

Alexis Milligan | Director

Alexis Milligan is the founding director of Transitus Creative, an interdisciplinary arts organization specializing in Art Communication and public engagement through the arts transitus.ca. She has been a project partner in knowledge translation and exchange with The Dalhousie University School of Nursing (Palliative Education through Art Communication and Engagement), the Association of Nova Scotia Museums (Touchstones), and with gender consultant Michelle Raine (It's A Girl!).

Alexis is also an acclaimed actor, movement specialist and director with a number of awards and nominations to her name. She is currently in her fourth season as Movement Director at The Shaw Festival in Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ontario. As a noted artistic collaborator she has created choreography and movement for many theatre companies across Canada including Two Planks and a Passion Theatre, Eastern Front Theatre, Mermaid Theatre, Off The Leash Ltd., OneLight Theatre and Theatre Gargantua. Other credits include movement and puppetry director for the sold out run of The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe at The Stratford Festival, as well as En Jülefortelling (A Christmas Carol) with the National Theatre of Norway in Bergen.

Sharisse LeBrun | Assistant Director

Sharisse LeBrun is an educator, director, performer and director of the TNB Theatre School. She has long been involved with the local theatre community with companies including Theatre St. Thomas, Theatre UNB, Bard in the Barracks, TNB Next Stage, Notable Acts, Hot Garbage Players and Solo Chicken. After years of attending the theatre school as a student she developed a passion for theatre education and began teaching for many of the junior programs as well as the summer theatre school. Having completed her MA in drama, theatre, and performance studies, she is thrilled to find herself back home teaching and creating with Theatre New Brunswick.

What makes us who we are is different for every person. Each person is on their own journey of self discovery and it is never ending. In psychology the word "identity" is used to describe qualities, beliefs, personality and the appearance or expression of a person or group. The categorization, or labeling, of individuals or groups can be positive or destructive.

Below is an excerpt from the Ontario Human Rights Commision's Policy on preventing discrimination because of gender identity and gender expression.

Trans people and other gender non-conforming individuals are often judged by their physical appearance for not fitting and conforming to stereotypical norms about what it means to be a "man" or "woman." They experience stigmatization, prejudice, bias and fear on a daily basis. While some may see trans people as inferior, others may lack awareness and understanding about what it means to be trans.

"The notion that there are two and only two genders is one of the most basic ideas in our binary Western way of thinking. Transgender people challenge our very understanding of the world. And we make them pay the cost of our confusion by their suffering."

Bias and prejudice, or simply ignorance, can lead to isolation, vulnerability, disadvantage and discrimination at school, at work, in stores and other services, or even where people live. Trans people living in smaller towns or rural communities may even be more isolated.

Stereotyping

Stereotyping is when assumptions are made about individuals based on assumptions about qualities and characteristics of the group they belong to. When people stereotype others, they do not see the real person. Stereotypes are often unfounded generalizations that come from misconceptions and incomplete or false information about people. Anyone can stereotype and not even realize it, even those who are well meaning.

There are widespread stereotypes about trans people in society that often go unquestioned. These include wrong ideas that trans people are "abnormal" or "unnatural," that they are "frauds," deceptive and or misrepresent themselves. They may be seen as more likely to take part in criminal activity, be pedophiles, or have mental health problems. Some believe trans women to be a threat to other women.

Anyone who engages in illegal activity including threatening or harassing behavior or assault should be dealt with accordingly under the law. This should not detract in any way from the rights of trans people.

False and harmful stereotypes are rooted in fear and uninformed attitudes and can lead to discrimination against trans people because of their gender identity or expression.

Transphobia

"Transphobia" is the aversion to, fear or hatred of trans people and communities. Like other prejudices, it is based on stereotypes that are used to justify discrimination, harassment and violence toward trans people.

Many trans Ontarians experience transphobia according to a transpulsecanada.ca survey:

- 98% of trans Ontarians reported at least one experience of transphobia
- Nearly 75% of trans people have been made fun of for being trans
- Over 25% have experienced physical violence because they were trans
- Nearly 25% reported being harassed by police
- Trans women experience transphobia more often than trans men.

Cisnormativity

"Cisnormativity" ("cis" meaning "the same as") refers to the commonplace assumption that all people are "cisgender" (not trans). In other words, their gender identity is in line with or "matches" the sex they were assigned at birth, and everyone accepts this as "the norm."

The term is used to describe stereotypes, negative attitudes and prejudice towards trans people that are more widespread or systemic in society and its institutions. This form of prejudice may even be unintentional and unrecognized by the person or organization responsible, making it all the more entrenched and difficult to address.



"Cisnormative assumptions are so prevalent that they are difficult at first to even recognize... Cisnormativity disallows the possibility of trans existence or trans visibility. As such, the existence of an actual trans person within systems such as healthcare is too often unanticipated and produces a social emergency of sorts because both staff and systems are unprepared for this reality."

WHY TRANSIPEOPLE NEED MORE VISIBILITY

With more visibility comes more understanding. These statistics can and will get better as trans people become more visible in our society.







The Basics

Terms to Know

Summary and basic terminology c/o transstudent.org

Cisgender/cis

Term for someone who exclusively identifies as their sex assigned at birth. The term cisgender is not indicative of gender expression, sexual orientation, hormonal makeup, physical anatomy, or how one is perceived in daily life.

Gender Expression/Presentation

The physical manifestation of one's gender identity through clothing, hairstyle, voice, body shape, etc. (typically referred to as masculine or feminine). Many transgender people seek to make their gender expression (how they look) match their gender identity (who they are), rather than their sex assigned at birth. Someone with a gender nonconforming gender expression may or may not be transgender.

Gender Identity

One's internal sense of being male, female, neither of these, both, or other gender(s). Everyone has a gender identity, including you. For transgender people, their sex assigned at birth and their gender identity are not necessarily the same.

Queer

A term for people of marginalized gender identities and sexual orientations who are not cisgender and/or heterosexual. This term has a complicated history as a reclaimed slur.

Sexual Orientation

A person's physical, romantic, emotional, aesthetic, and/or other form of attraction to others. In Western cultures, gender identity and sexual orientation are not the same. Trans people can be straight, bisexual, lesbian, gay, asexual, pansexual, queer, etc. just like anyone else. For example, a trans woman who is exclusively attracted to other women would often identify as lesbian.

Transgender/Trans


Encompassing term of many gender identities of those who do not identify or exclusively identify with their sex assigned at birth. The term transgender is not indicative of gender expression, sexual orientation, hormonal makeup, physical anatomy, or how one is perceived in daily life.

Transition

A person's process of developing and assuming a gender expression to match their gender identity. Transition can include: coming out to one's family, friends, and/or co-workers; changing one's name and/or sex on legal documents; hormone therapy; and possibly (though not always) some form of surgery. It's best not to assume how one transitions as it is different for everyone.






Being Emily by Rachel Gold
