In 1959, Vivian Larsen set off from Moncton in a horse drawn wagon to meet Walt Disney and tell him a mysterious secret. At the same time, a young gay boy growing up in Shediac is beginning to understand himself and the divides that threaten to tear his community, province, and family apart.

Welcome to Theatre New Brunswick

Theatre New Brunswick acknowledges that it carries out its work on the traditional unceded territory of the Wolastoqiyik, Mi'kmaq and Peskotomuhkati peoples. This territory is covered by the "Treaties of Peace and Friendship" which these nations first signed with the British Crown in 1726. The treaties did not deal with the surrender of lands and resources, but in fact recognized Mi'kmaq and Wolastoqiyik title and established the rules for what was to be an ongoing relationship between nations.

We, the staff and members of the board, pay respect to the elders, past and present, and descendants of this land. We honour the knowledge keepers and seek their guidance as we strive to develop closer relationships with the Indigenous people of New Brunswick.

A Message from our Artistic & Executive Director

In Resident Aliens, we travel through time to watch two parallel stories unfold on different timelines in the same New Brunswick. Time and place have an enormous impact on the characters in our play, as they do on most of us. And like many of us, our main characters struggle with understanding their place in history, how they fit in. In this play, Don's portrayal of life in a white, late-fifties New Brunswick focuses on tensions between the anglophone and francophone communities that continue to inform and shape colonial, white communities that exist on the unceded territory of the Mi'kmaq, Wolastaoquey and Passamaquoddey peoples. Resident Aliens is Don's story, but it's also a story of New Brunswick and the generations of settlers who have shaped the province we live in today.

I first met Don Hannah when he cast me in a production of his play, There is a Land of Pure Delight. We got to spend a few weeks working together at LiveBait Theatre in Sackville and became fast friends. His career has spanned decades and his words have been spoken on stages across the country. So when I came to TNB and learned he had never been produced by the company, I knew that was something I wanted to make happen. For him, and for you.

New Brunswick has both fuelled and frustrated me my entire life. There are places that have been powerfully beautiful to me since I was a boy... and, while I loved the place, it drove me crazy."

Much like Boy in my play, I grew up in a small English community in an Acadian town, and like him as well, that community was so immediate and all enclosing that I was an adolescent before I fully understood that my small Anglo world wasn't the majority. This state of affairs, of very different worlds sharing the same geographical space, has been a constant factor throughout my writing from Rubber Dolly, my very first play, on up through In The Lobster Capital of the World, Running Far Back, There Is A Land of Pure Delight, Cave Painter, and now Resident Aliens—my New Brunswick related work.



New Brunswick has both fuelled and frustrated me my entire life. There are places that have been powerfully beautiful to me since I was a boy: the Scoudouc River in the woods up our street, the Sainte-Anne-de-Beaumont Chapel near Pré d'en Haut, Cape Enrage, the Tantramar Marsh—and, while I loved the place, it drove me crazy. When I was a teenager in love with books, there was no English bookstore in Moncton, and, apart from two or three dedicated teachers, my twelve years of schooling left a lot to be desired (my Grade 12 English teacher gave me permission to write a book report on Animal Farm even though "you probably won't understand it.").

In my small Anglo world, the arts were not ours, they were something that passed through on tour. But my mother played the piano—old popular songs and Eastern Star marches, mostly—and took us to concerts; my father paid for my brothers' piano classes and the art classes I took from Sister Gertrude Godbout (then Sister Leonide) at Notre Dame D'Acadie all through middle and high school. I owe much to the cultural life of L'Acadie—a screening of Jean Cocteau's Orphée at U de M, changed me forever.

This play is dedicated to two New Brunswick women I adored, Jenny Munday and Betty Lou Daye. I talked so much over the years about the world of this play to them both. I'd also like to acknowledge two Monctonian Toronto friends, Tom Leighton and the late Dayne Ogilvie, who both loved talking with me about Mrs. Larsen and Bob.

My deep thanks to Natasha MacLellan for commissioning (and directing!) the play, and to the wonderful company of actors and designers who have put it together. Thanks to the TNB staff, who have been so welcoming.

Thanks to the Canada Council for a grant to write about New Brunswick that, eventually, led me to Resident Aliens. And thanks to the NB Archives, and the Moncton Public Library for research assistance. The late Mrs George Harrop led me to the Front Page Challenge story forty years ago. A huge thanks to Peter Enneson for his great-great-great-great-great-grandfather genealogical research.

Thanks to Didi Gillard-Rowlings and Bridget Bezanson for saving the day, and to Christopher Hunt and Ryan Rogerson, who have been onboard since the first reading. For their workshop and dramaturgical skills, my thanks to Ron Jenkins, Mélanie LeBlanc (those photos! merci!), Burgundy Code, Leni Parker, and Wesley Colford, thank-you, thank-you.

My love to my old theatre comrades Joan MacLeod, Ken Garnhum, and Colleen Murphy for their constant affection and support. And to Ryan Griffith and Xavier Gould (aka Jass-Sainte Bourque, aka Chiquita Mére) my deep affection for helping to keep two very different New Brunswicks present in my life - thanks and merci.

And to Doug Guildford, who phoned me more than a quarter century ago, all my love.

Don Hannah Playwright

Don Hannah is an award winning playwright and novelist. His pair of one person shows, The Cave Painter & The Woodcutter, are published by Playwrights Canada Press, and Cave Painter received the 2012 Carol Bolt Award. He was the inaugural Lee Playwright in Residence at the University of Alberta where

he wrote While We're Young, which has been produced across the country. He has also had residencies at Tarragon Theatre, Canadian Stage, UBC's Green College, UNB, the Yukon Public Library, and is a fellow of the MacDowell Colony. He has worked as a dramaturge at Playwrights Theatre Centre, the Banff Playwrights Colony, and Playwrights Atlantic Resource Centre, of which he is a founding member and honourary lifetime member. His books include Shoreline, a collection of his plays, and the novels, The Wise and Foolish Virgins, and Ragged Islands, both published by Knopf. Ragged Islands was awarded the Thomas H. Raddall Atlantic Fiction Award. His latest play, Resident Aliens, will be produced by Theatre New Brunswick in the spring of 2023.
